<u>KEYNOTE SPEAKER</u>: Think upstream - Are you ready for the promotion revolution?

Margaret Barry is a professor who works closely with policymakers and practitioners on the development, implementation and evaluation of mental health promotion interventions and policies at national and international level. Margaret has a keen interest in both the generation of evidence for mental health promotion and its translation for policy and practice. She currently holds the Established Chair in Health Promotion and Public Health at the National University of Ireland Galway, where she is Head of the WHO Collaborating Centre for Health Promotion Research.

Margaret was elected as Global Vice President for Capacity Building, Education and Training by the International Union for Health Promotion and Education from 2007 to 2010. She has served as Temporary Advisor to the WHO and has acted as project leader on major European Union funded initiatives. Appointed to the European Commission Expert Panel on Effective Ways of Investing in Health from 2013-2016, she was re-appointed for a second term from 2016-2019. She is also co-author of the international text Implementing Mental Health Promotion, a second edition of which is currently being prepared for publication.

Judy is a Mi'kmaq woman from Abegweit First Nation. She is extremely active in her community and is committed to Aboriginal and women's issues within PEI and Canada in general. She is President of the PEI Aboriginal Women's Association,

Executive Council for Native Women's Association of Canada and is the PEI representative for the RCMP Commissioner's National Aboriginal Advisory Committee. Judy has been a volunteer with the Girl Guides of Canada for 30 years and is currently a Mi'kmaw Circle Keeper with PEI's Aboriginal Justice Program. In recognition of her work, Judy was presented with a Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal, 2012. In May 2014 she was appointed on the Premier's Action Committee on Family Violence Prevention as a representative of the Aboriginal Women's Association of PEI. On May 13 2017, Judy was presented an Honorary Doctor of Laws by the University of Prince Edward Island.

Judy has a professional background in finance and conflict resolution, Researcher and has worked with the Department of National Defense, Abegweit First Nation and the Mi'kmaq Confederacy of PEI. She shares her traditional knowledge in a joint project with Parks Canada and today has a small business: "Epekwitk Mi'kmaq Cultural Consulting",

With the support of her husband, John, she leads her life in accordance with the teachings of her Elders. She is a proud mother of two daughters and has three granddaughters and a grandson.
