## **1. Roadmap for Social and Emotional Learning (SEL)** Implementation

Presenters: Ellen Coady and Rhonda McKinnon, Newfoundland and Labrador Department of Education and Early Childhood Development

So you want to make a start on Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) in your practice! This session will provide you with some practical tips on how to start using Social and Emotional Learning where we work, live and play. Participants will have an opportunity to collaborate with other participants and practice some SEL strategies. Group facilitated discussions aim to provide guidance on introducing social and emotional learning to your organization using a roadmap analogy that will provide participants with information and insight on important steps to consider on the road to implementing social and emotional learning.

#### Connection with the ASI theme:

This session explores the implementation of Social and Emotional Learning using a Comprehensive School Health (CSH) approach and acknowledges the importance of SEL across the lifespan and in all settings. Working in all four components of CSH to implement SEL promotes a whole society approach to promoting child and youth mental health.

#### Participants will learn:

Participants will learn about a comprehensive school health approach, the competencies of Social and Emotional Learning and how to develop the same in individuals. Practical tools that will help participants begin the process of using social and emotional learning in their daily practice will be explored in both an individual and group context.

#### Evidence for policy and practice:

One of the outcomes of this session is bringing focus to the value of working together to promote child and youth mental health. Successfully scaling up or delivering policies and programs requires the development of partnerships to support the work.
